

Section 3. Qualitative Interview Guide

The qualitative interview guide has been published in the study protocol and is publicly available.¹

We began all interviews by providing participants with an overview of the study and receiving verbal consent. Initial interview questions asked about participants' sociodemographic characteristics and organizational roles. We then proceeded to ask participants about their attitudes and perspectives on 1) the introduction and evolution of MAiD in Canada; 2) the relationship between MAiD and PEOLC; 3) supportive care and important conversations about MAiD; and, 4) the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on MAiD and PEOLC services. We concluded the interview by summarizing and checking the discussed themes. All participants were given the opportunity to add any further comments and ask questions.
